

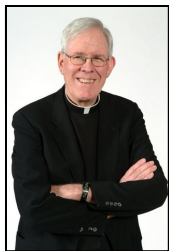
CHAS Annual Convention to Speak to *The Grace of Age*

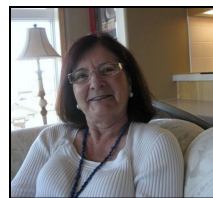

Msgr. Fahey began a long career that led to many appointments to local, state and national boards, including terms as a board member of the Catholic Health Association of the United States. Currently, Fahey is the



Marie Ward Doty professor of aging studies and senior associate at Fordham's Third Age Center. Fahey is noted for coining the term "the third age" and will speak to how individuals and society as a whole are deeply challenged by all sorts of issues and new dilemmas, such as, having more than one generation at a time dependent on senior care.

Micheline Paré is the author of "The Passion of Loving: the congruent and compassionate approach™ (CCA) in caring for people with loss of autonomy." She has offered many inspirational sessions to professionals and family caregivers throughout Canada in both official languages, always bringing an appeal to the practice of compassion.



New to the convention this year is the call for proposals which will offer **workshop opportunities** for many who serve in health care – be they in acute, long-term care, parishes, or other community groups. The invitation to share stories and wisdom, experiences and best practices (and maybe even mistakes) offers sacred insights into the everyday – how the ordinary can then become extraordinary. The charisma of this convention is the anticipated renewal for those committed to the healing ministry of Christ, as we journey in this grace-filled time together.

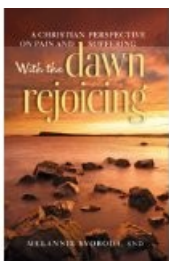

What’s a good visit without bearing a gift? Within our travels CHAS has started a new initiative to build a Leader’s Library in each of our member institutions.



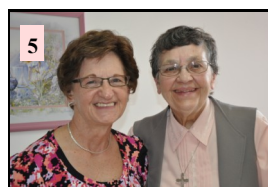
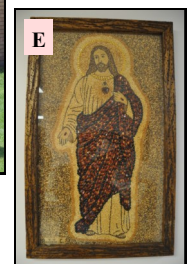
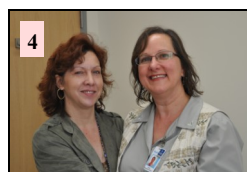
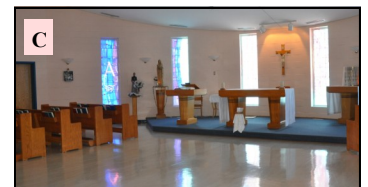
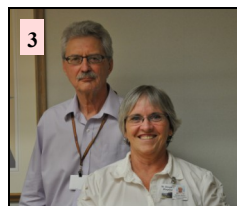

Compassion: The Heart of Our Vision was the theme of the joint national conference of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada

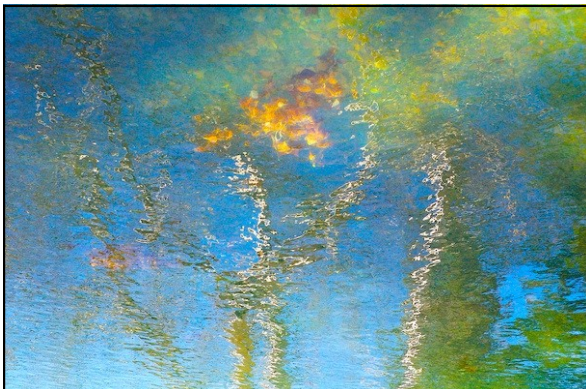
